This article looks at the challenges of stakeholder management on cross-border projects. Interviewees include project manager Ian Cribbes, a member of the SEFG team, who talks about collaboration across time zones, language and culture.

This research explored secondary (local community) stakeholders in major public infrastructure and construction projects (MPIC). Well organised actions from ‘secondary stakeholder’ groups can lead to project delays and cost overruns. This report looks at stakeholder management practices at the local level and how they might improve project performance.

Two books published in 2017 that address the challenge of stakeholder management:

- **[“Practical Project Stakeholder Management: Methods, Tools and Templates for Comprehensive Stakeholder Management”](#)**

The title of the book is misleading as it focused on basic stakeholder analysis rather than how to sustain stakeholder engagement throughout the project lifecycle. But if you're looking for basic tools to get you started, you may get some ideas.

- **[“Stakeholder Management: 50 Ways That you can Become Brilliant at Project Stakeholder Management, or How to Engage, Inspire and Manage Even Difficult Stakeholders”](#)**  
**Bryan Barrow, February 2017**

This book also starts with the basics - ‘Stakeholder Management 101’ - but does go on to what you need to do once you've identified your stakeholders. Author Bryan Barrow is a former Chair of the APM's specific interest group on Risk Management. His risk management heritage shows up in the first chapter where he points to some of the people-related issues that can lead to project failure, factors that probably don't feature in many risk registers.

According to one review: *“This book, in digestible simple chunks has helped me enormously to cope with many different issues.”*
